Simon Boersma of Pleasant Homes returns for his third year and third acclamation as Chamber President. David Marshall of Champion Petfoods will serve the board as Vice President for the upcoming year.

Previous board members Phil Hughes of Premium Food Services, Steve Hammond of Morinville Autobody, Charlene Whitfield of Blind Designs, Kym Moore of Servus Credit Union, Penny Modien of Scotiabank, and Barrett Dupuis of UFA were acclaimed to another term on the board as directors at large.

They are joined by newcomers Matt Meunier of Morinville Shell, Keith Norris of COP, Samantha Olson of Putnam & Lawson, Jeff Lamarche of Sarbecnat Plumbing & Heating, and Grant Cree of Grant Cree Event Photography.

With 13 members, the Chamber now has a larger board than it has had in recent years.

Looking forward with that number, the Chamber President said the board will spend some time drafting bylaws and succession planning. "This past year we went through significant changes. Even today I felt a great momentum with our board going forward," Boersma said, adding he wants to work on retaining board members so as to have a succession plan to move members to the executive. "We are also working on ensuring anyone who sits on the executive has served on the board, so they understand the issues at hand."

In his recap of the previous year's activities, Boersma said the Chamber had several successes. Starting with the slogan "Get the news while it's still news," MorinvilleNews.com launched as a digital daily with a commitment to living up to the slogan I had chosen.

June 11 marks the fifth anniversary of MorinvilleNews.com, the website that began our community news venture.

Over the past five years, the business has changed rapidly. When we launched our website, Facebook was celebrating its sixth anniversary of operation. Five year's later, Facebook is the dominant player in the social media game, and according to a recent communications survey, many of you get your community information from our Facebook page - Facebook.com/MorinvilleNews.

Following that trend of quick and to the point, over the past five years news stories have gotten shorter. Gone are the days of long-form journalism with stories of 1200 to 1400 words. These days stories range between 400 and 600 words to get you the information you need quickly.

We've also started showing you the news more and more, something relatively unique for a community under 10000. Thus far response to our video news

pieces and photo galleries has been positive.

Later this summer we hope to unveil our Morinville-News App to to keep you connected to your community even more.

Though we've experienced some technological changes over the past five years, one thing has not changed - our commitment to the community.

We have organized, promoted or sponsored everything from music concerts, comedy shows and festivals to wrestling matches and bringing medieval knights and superheroes to this year's MPS Children's Carnival.

We got behind People for the Steeple, and we jumped into Hockeyville in a major way.

We've enjoyed every minute of being involved in the community. It's been a great ride thus far, and we are excited about the continued growth and continued community involvement in our sixth year of operation.

None of this would have been possible without our readers joining us for the ride these past five years. Nor would it be possible without those local businesses, organizations and institutions who have seen value in what we were doing.

This publication has survived in a dying industry because our readers and advertisers have supported us well. You have kept us informed about all the things we need to cover.

Column: Mature nations confront darkest periods

Justice Murray Sinclair has shown us a way to a better Canada, a Canada we should all aspire to, a Canada we wrongly believe we already live in today.

The chair of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Canada has reminded us that mature nations confront their darkest periods. They do not run from them, they learn from them and they try to right them.

And he has reminded us that the ugly legacy of our residential schools is not an aboriginal problem, but a Canadian problem.

He is not demanding penance, he told an emotional ceremony in a packed Ottawa hotel ballroom, but is offering us a second chance at an equal relationship between First Nations and non-aboriginals in this country.

But, what price reconciliation?

His 94 recommendations — his call to action — include many that are controversial, certainly many that will be extremely costly.

There were two ways to read these recommendations.

One would be in the context of that room Tuesday, where Kleenex was distributed by yellow-vested volunteers as men and women wept listening to testimony from survivors on a video screen.

One could read them as survivors were asked to stand, and one by one they tentatively rose from their seats, given long, respectful ovations that they accepted with a doleful stoicism. Commissioner Marie Wilson paid tribute to them for their "bravery and trust" in telling their stories and challenged Canadians to show the same bravery in reconciling the past.

She spoke of the estimated 6,000 children who perished apart from their families, who were buried at schools that had cemeteries but not playgrounds, who perished in fires or were found huddled together in the bush, frozen to death.

But outside that room, many Canadians will ask why they should be asked to pay in 2015 for some-

thing that previous governments did in past generations.

They will see many of the recommendations as symbolic.

The commission has called on the federal government to adopt and implement the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, something to which the Conservatives now merely "aspire."

It wants a Royal Proclamation of Reconciliation, it wants Pope Francis to come to Canada within a year to issue an apology for the role of the Catholic church in the residential schools, it wants all levels of government to provide annual reports on the progress toward reconciliation. It wants the prime minister to issue an annual "State of Aboriginal Peoples" report. It wants a monument to the survivors in Ottawa and all provincial capitals and a national holiday honouring survivors and victims.

They may see others as controversial – a change to the oath of citizenship to include respect for treaties with indigenous people, a requirement that all law and journalism students in Canada be taught the legacy of residential schools and a requirement that medical and nursing schools make aboriginal health a required subject.

Others will be rejected by this government: the call for an inquiry into missing and murdered aboriginal women and restoration and an increase in CBC funding, the latter a nod to its vital link to the north and aboriginal languages.

They will see others as expensive. But they must be done.

Sinclair wants judges allowed to ignore mandatory minimum sentences for aboriginals and end the over representation of aboriginals in prisons over the next decade. It wants an end to the gap in education funding between aboriginals and non-aboriginals within one generation.

Sinclair has reached for the moon, but he said he was writing for the future, "not just this government."

Since Harper's historic 2008 apology, relations between his government and First Nations have foundered. Twice, Sinclair's commission had to take Ottawa to court to force the release of documents relevant to its search for truth and the commissioner said Tuesday that "words are not enough."

For Canadians wondering why we must deal today with the errors of past generations, the short answer is it is because that's what responsible nations do – they try to correct past wrongs.

Romeo Saganash, an NDP MP who spent 10 years in residential schools and confronted his own demons from that experience, said it best.

Saganash had never heard a word of English or French when he arrived at a residential school in La Tuque, Que.


Shortly after his arrival, his father died, but he could not return to his community to grieve.

He wants Canadians to move forward with him. "We are all in this together," he told the House of Commons.

If this is the Canada we like to think it is, those words should ring true.

Sturgeon School Division Chair frustrated with lack of movement on school site

In his report to the board May 27, Sturgeon School Division Chair Terry Jewell spoke of the site for the new middle school and the board's aggressive pursual of a location.

"Basically what we are indicating is we are aggressively seeking a site to build a new [Grade] 5-9 with possible expansion to [Grade] 12 school in Morinville," he said. "A small problem we have right now is we do not have a site. We've had a few meetings now with the Town - probably two directly in the last couple of months and one [a] year before and [a] year before that. For some reason, it seems slow in coming."

Jewell went on to say that until a school site is designated to the division, the province will not release the \$750,000 of planning funds promised to the division.

"So it is why we are getting a bit excited not having a site, but [I] suppose everybody is working diligently to get there not been sitting around for the last six months wondering what is going on," he said.

Jewell said he was concerned about getting a

site soon so the division can start planning. The existing Morinville Public School is already at 100 per cent capacity. The board chair said six modulars are being added to the school just to cover off the expected enrollment growth for the upcoming year.

"There is another year after that where we could have no school ready, so [we] could need another four, five or six modulars," Jewell said.

The chair said he will continue to work with the Town of Morinville in the hopes something comes up soon.

But he is concerned that time is of the essence.

"The concern is always that it is now May and in about five weeks, not much staff will be around that can do a lot of planning and that kind of stuff," Jewell said. "So it is becoming a concern to the board that we will be further and further behind."

The proposed sites to date for the new public school are South Glens, Westwinds (north of No Frills) and consideration given to utilizing some of the land associated with the new Multi-Plex/Recreation Centre.

Festival Society changes mind on chair

Just one month after announcing that Morinville Festival Society Vice Chair David LeBel would step into the Chair role after Festival Chair Paul Smith steps down, the society has reversed its decision at their June 3 meeting.

The new decision will see Society member and Farmers' Market Manager Korien Sampson take over the top slot when Smith steps back at the end of this year's St. Jean Baptiste Festival.

In May Smith had said he was stepping back, not down from the group he has been an active part in for the past half decade.

According to Smith, the reversal of the decision was to give LeBel, a recent member, another year on the board before taking over. "There is no question as to David's leadership. Korien has six plus years of experience knowing the Town's administration people and public works," Smith said, adding those connections will be beneficial on the road ahead. "David has the workhorse skills and the energy to propel us forward. What we were thinking we needed at this time was to rely on experience. Then as David has more experience, he will go into the Chair position."

Smith said the decision to put Sampson in as Chair was unanimous.

What is the Land Use Bylaw Amendment about?

2. make minor text changes to the Direct Control – Cœur de Morinville Residential (DC-C) District to improve the practical application procedures of the district's provisions resulting from lessons learned by this application to use this district for the first time.

The proposed amendment will allow for the development of a stacked duplex with secondary suite and detached garage.




You are invited to attend a Public Hearing for Grandin Heights Area Structure Plan and Land Use Bylaw Amendments and provide your comments directly to Council. If you prefer to write to Council, send your written comments to the Legislative Officer before 4:30 pm on June 22nd, 2015. These comments will be reviewed as part of the hearing process.

What are these Bylaw Amendments about?

The purpose of **Bylaw 11/2015** is to amend the Grandin Heights Area Structure Plan (ASP) Bylaw 19/2006 to re-distribute the land use designations on: Parts of East Half of NE ¼ 34-55-25-W4; W ¼ of NE ¼ 34-55-25-W4; SE ¼ 34-55-25-W4; Lot 8R, Block 17, Plan 792 0204; and Lot 9MR, Block 17, Plan 102 1281; containing ±5.37 ha; to support a compact residential development.

The purpose of **Bylaw 12/2015** is to change Land Use Bylaw 3/2012, Schedule A – Land Use District Map, from Two-Unit Residential (R-2) District, Medium Density Residential (R-3) District, and Parks and Open Spaces (POS) Districts to *Proposed* Notre Dame Village Site Specific Residential (DC-3-8) District and Parks and Open Spaces (POS) District for the above noted lands (shown right).



Planning & Development supports these proposed bylaws.

How Will This Affect Me?

or Pretty
Plants?**

Do you have a beautiful problem growing in your yard?

Gardeners are a resourceful bunch; we are great at finding plants that help us create that perfect garden oasis. How often have you participated in a plant or seed exchange, foraged for perennials from friends and family or just saw something beautiful growing along side the road and decided to dig it up and bring it home? Although this is a great way to add to your growing collection of blooms in your yard, do you know what it is that you're planting?

As a landscaper and garden coach, I am often asked about plants that clients have in their yards. Often the client is not even sure where these plants came from but they have become invasive and are taking over the garden causing the other plants to suffer. More often than not these plants are noxious weeds and are on Alberta's Invasive plant list. Some of the ones that I see on a regular basis are Creeping Bellflower, Yellow Clematis, Scentless Chamomile, Dame's Rocket and Oxeye Daisy.

The Alberta Weed Control Act categorize plants into the following:

Prohibited Noxious Weed: Plants in this category are either not currently found in Alberta or are found in few locations such that eradication could be possible. Under the Weed Control Act, a person has the responsibility to destroy a prohibited noxious weed.

Noxious Weed: Plants listed in this category are considered to widely distributed to eradicate. A local authority may conduct control programs for these weeds if they feel they may have significant ecological or economic impact on lands within their municipality.

Although not illegal to grow these plants, as a homeowner or occupier you are responsible for the control of any of the noxious weeds that grow on your property. Check with your local municipality or governing body to see what bylaws if any pertain to the control of these plants in your area.

The list is much to long to list here, but you can see the complete list and pictures of each of the plants if you download the Alberta Invasive Plant Identification Guide. Or go to the municipal office and ask for any information, they may have this guide on hand.

can do a tremendous amount of damage to Alberta's Landscape and to the plants, insects and animals that depend on it.

The negative effects include:

- reducing the amount of habitat for native species, which then causes problems for our native species of insects, plants fish or animals that rely on the native plants
- reducing property values for residents and agricultural producers
- introducing potentially harmful chemicals into the environment in the form of herbicides.
- increasing expenses for municipalities, producers and property owners.

As gardeners what can you do?

- brush up on your knowledge of these plants so that you will easily recognize them.
- when purchasing plants for your yard, select native species, they thrive in our climate and are beneficial for the province's bees butterflies, birds, and animals.
- be cautious about buying wildflower seeds, because they may include the seeds of some of the noxious plants.
- if you have any of these plants on your property, do all that you can to remove them and dispose of them properly. Information on the links provided will instruct you on the most effective way to do so. Or hire a professional like myself to come out and give you a hand.

Rotary invites region to hear about Athabasca rec project

The 2008 Athabasca Multiplex Project was the topic at the June 3 Rotary meeting. More than 40 Rotary members and guests, including elected officials from Sturgeon County, Redwater, Bon Accord and Morinville, as well as representatives from both school divisions, came out to hear guest speaker Robert Balay.

Balay was the Multiplex Fundraising Chair and Coordinator for the Athabasca project and heavily involved in putting the facility together over time. He spent seven years as CAO for the Athabasca Regional Multiplex Society.

His half-hour presentation covered the history of the Athabasca Multiplex project, the collaboration between municipalities, fundraising initiatives, project governance, and governance of the facility once completed.

Balay said the project started with a needs assessment. "It was determined the number one priority was that the community wanted to see a multiplex use facility built, with stress on multi-use. [It was] to become a recreational hub, and also to be used as a community center and conference center," Balay told Rotarians.

A number of committees were formed by the town and county to facilitate the project and to determine what should go in it. The speaker spoke of the arrangement between the town and county in seeing the project to completion. As the two municipalities wanted and needed to have control when it came down to the actual amount of money being spent, the Executive Committee was composed of both town and county CAOs, Regional Recreation Director, mayor, county reeve and two councillors from each municipality. Balay said the committee reported to the Joint Town Council and each council had to ratify any decision that was brought forward.

"To begin with we had some pretty grand ideas, but reality eventually sunk in," Balay said. "There was a budget but only so much money the community could afford. Had we been able to make up our minds a little sooner - our project from the time we first started to the time we actually said let's go doubled in cost.

"I wish we could have done it a bit sooner because it would have saved us money and we would have been able to build everything that we wanted. But we did have to scale it back, but in the end we have a facility that suits our needs very well."

Balay advised Morinville to seize current market opportunities. "Right now is a pretty good economic time to go out to tender; there is a lot of appetite out there so [you] should be able to do pretty good if you are ready to go," he said.

He advocated for the collaborative approach in building such a facility.

"That was very important," Balay said. "When you work collaboratively that will be the case. You will find that if you have three or four municipalities doing a project together, which is maybe what you are looking at, that will probably be the same process you will go through."

His closing message was that good things can happen when different sectors of the community and municipalities work together.

"Neighbouring municipalities are willing to work together for the common goal," he said. "I think we [Athabasca] are a good example that things can happen, and the benefits are enormous."
