

## Speeding tickets nearly quadruple

Some members of Council were fuming following revelations in administration's first quarter report that show a significant increase in photo radar ticketing in 2016. Councillor Stephen Dafoe was so disgruntled about how much time was being spent at town exits he quipped: "I'm wondering why we don't put advertisements up on photo enforcement cars so that we can pull double-duty?"

The report, which was included in the Town's First Quarter Report, was presented to Council by David

Schaefer, Director of Corporate Operations.

The report shows a near quadrupling of photo enforcement tickets since the previous quarter with 1815 tickets issued in the first quarter of 2016 compared to 583 in the last quarter of 2015. Nearly 50 per cent of the time was spent at three spots.

Schaefer highlighted changes in the management of the region by photo radar technology contractor Global Traffic Group Inc.

These changes did not mitigate concerns from Council, however, and the report received universal criticism from the Councillors' table.

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## Fingler reflects on year as Rotary president

Rotary Club of Morinville President Sheldon Fingler has enjoyed his year of wielding the club's gavel but says he is looking forward to getting back to being a rank-and-file member.

"I feel that when you sit up at the front, you sometimes lose touch with everything else that's going on in the club," Fingler said, adding the Morinville club is an active one. "When you are sitting at the front you are more worried about following the rules and keeping things in line and covering all the bases. I don't get to have as much fun as I like to."

And for Fingler and many of the region's residents, Rotary is a place to have fun while doing some important work.

Fingler was drawn to the club not only for the good work and good times but because many of his role models growing up were Rotarians.

"When I was a kid, I remember Rotary, and Rotary for me was the place to be," he recalled. "I saw Rotary as the real movers and shakers in the community, the true leaders of the community. They were the business leaders, the community leaders, and I always saw those people in Rotary."

After years of thinking about it, Fingler received an invitation to join and took the opportunity. He's never looked back.

But looking back over the last year as the club's president, Fingler said the highlight for him has been the people, bringing in an exchange student, having a second exchange student coming in the near future, and sending a local student to Bolivia. Additionally, Rotary's recent success with their Johnny Cash tribute show was a highlight for Fingler.

"That [show] was motivated by the fact that last year we lost one of our fundraisers due to some constraints that were beyond our control," Fingler said. "I had this desire to replace what we missed last year. I wanted to figure out a way to do it."

That desire, combined with club confidence and efforts, resulted in two performances in front of 750 people generating a rough profit of \$10,000 for the club, monies Fingler said will go back into the communities Rotary

serves.

Some of that local effort will go into a new washroom for Rotary Park, a spot that carries the club's name and commitment to beautifying and looking after the park.

"Rotary has always been about kids," Fingler said. One of the things that came up is a mom goes to the park and is having fun with the kids, but if you have to go to the washroom, you end up leaving, and you don't come back. We wanted to put in something to allow the moms and the families to stay there longer by providing a decent washroom."

Fingler said the club checked with neighbouring residents and believed the new washroom will enhance Rotary Park.

It's the hands-on involvement like the upcoming park project that Fingler said has him looking forward to jumping back into the fray when incoming president Simon Boersma takes over next month.

"I cannot wait to get back into the rank-and-file of Rotary," he said. "The person at the front is only one member of the team, and I've always believed that I'm no more important than any Rotarian. In a lot of ways, I feel I'm less important because Rotary is the members. I want to get back to being one of the members and feel you've got more opportunities for doing things when you are not involved with overseeing things."

But whether the president of just a regular member, it is the feeling he gets at the weekly meetings that Fingler enjoys most. Even though they start early in the morning, they make up an opportunity for fellowship and camaraderie that he and the others try not to miss.

"Sometimes you don't want to get up early in the morning, and you don't want to get going to that meeting," Fingler said of the club's 7:15 a.m. start. "But then you get into the room, and immediately you feel invigorated. I feel so much better. I leave Wednesday morning feeling a thousand times better about the rest of the week than when I got there. That group of people, the attitudes, the friendliness, the handshakes, hugs, and smiles - everything about it and you cannot help but leave happier than when you started."

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# Outstanding Morinville citizen passes

Raymonde Riopel (nee Perras) passed away May 8 leaving a legacy of volunteerism and devotion to family and community.

Riopel was born, raised and lived her life in Morinville and was a great spokesperson for the community.

Her father Joseph H. Perras came from a pioneer founding family who had established a homestead originally five miles outside of Morinville.

Joseph Perras was a community builder, contributing to the development of Morinville for more than 40 years. He and his wife Rose-Anna Huot raised a family of eight children.

From 1920 to 1985 the Perras family owned the residence on 100 Avenue now known as Perras Place, which houses the Morinville & District Chamber of Commerce.



Raymonde became a teacher in 1939 at the age of 19 years and continued in the profession for 45 years, retiring in 1985. She taught many students and many generations within the same family.

After her retirement, Raymonde was a trustee for the Thibault School District from 1986 to 1989, and also served as a member of the Sturgeon Regional Recreation Council for three years.

She was also a General Insurance Agent in Morinville for 37 years and a life member of the Alberta Teachers Association.

Raymonde was always actively involved in the community and was awarded the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal in 2002 for "having made a significant contribution to her community in the field of French and Catholic education."

She was a member of Les Femmes Chretienne (Christian Ladies) group, the Catholic Women's League, and was also made an honorary member of the Conseil des

Sages de la Francophonie Albertaine in October of 2004. Additionally, Riopel was a member of the committee who published the third Pictorial History book of the Town, was a member of the Morinville Naming Committee and the Morinville Historical & Cultural Society, and served as a consultant on many various committees.

During Morinville's Centennial Year in 2011, she was presented with the Town's Legacy Award for her long-standing contributions to the community.

Raymonde married her husband Roland Riopel in 1946, a man who was a descendant of a founding family (Armand Riopel). The couple raised five children.

Raymonde is survived by her five children: Paul (Debbie), Jeanne (Gary) Nash, Robert (Bernice), Rita and Suzanne (Larry) Farrell, and ten grandchildren: Genevieve Gray, Luc and Jordan Riopel, Christine Allaby, Karen Nash, Nicole Kuzio, Reece Riopel, Jacqueline Geinger, Celine and Liam Farrell. Also left to mourn are 11 great grandchildren. A Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated at St. Jean Baptiste Catholic Church May 14 and was followed by interment in the St. Jean Baptiste Catholic Cemetery.

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
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## PUBLIC HEARING Westwinds Area Structure Plan (ASP) Bylaw Amendment

## Utility Bylaw Revision Proposed for July 1, 2016

As a means to reduce ongoing collection efforts, the Town of Morinville is proposing utility bylaw revisions which will no longer permit utility accounts in tenants names on a go forward approach effective July 1, 2016.

Current tenant accounts will remain in effect until such time as:

- Tenant Vacates
- Tenant is scheduled for disconnection of service due to account arrears.

Once one of the above conditions occurs, the property owner will:

- Apply for a new utility account
- Pay a \$35 connection fee
- Be liable for all utility/landfill charges

Account holders are eligible to receive one landfill permit per account which can be used at the property owner's discretion, with user pay charges continuing to be charged on the monthly utility bill. Options available for property owners include:

- Including utilities in rent charges collected from their tenant,
- Pay directly on behalf of your business,
- Request utility bill be sent directly to service address (tenant) and Owner
- Payments will continue to be accepting by the tenant and/or owner.

Initially presented at the Committee of the Whole April 19, 2016, and having received 1st reading at the April 26, 2016 Regular meeting of Council; the bylaw revisions will be brought for 2nd and 3rd reading on May 10th and 24th respectively. Should 3rd reading be received, all property owners will be contacted to advise of the change and describe in detail how the changes will impact their account. 

Councillor Stephen Dafoe expressed concern about the amount of time spent on Cardiff Road and at the pumphouse at the east exit to Town. These two locations have been repeatedly referred to by Dafoe as "honey spots" where a lot of revenue is generated from common speeding offenses.

Many comments and questions from Council were related to school zone photo enforcement hours and the amount of time enforcement spends there.

Schaefer commented that officers patrol school zones in Morinville "every single day" in addition to the enforcement done by photo radar.

Echoing much of the rest of Council, Councillor Rob Ladouceur said the message needs to be clear to the operators that this is not the change that Council wanted.

"This does not say safety to me; this says income to me," Ladouceur said. "It doesn't look like a safety program when I see over 1000 tickets in two spots."

Councillor Gord Putnam was concerned that if the program continues like this, the public may want to scrap photo enforcement entirely.

"If we continue at this rate, it will become that the public will not accept it as being reasonable," he said. "We put the program at risk by continuing to look like we're just doing things to generate revenue. The people are going to get to the point where they've had enough of it. I think that there is reasonable enforcement, and if we are doing it in a way that seems fair

to everyone in the public ... then I'm good with it. But when I start seeing the numbers in those areas ... I don't think that speaks well about what we want to happen."

Putnam went on to suggest that Council should potentially look at directly legislating limits on time spent in certain areas, as previously suggested by Councillor Nicole Boutestein.

"Clearly what we are asking for is just not happening," Putnam said.

Mayor Lisa Holmes wanted to see more photo enforcement time spent in playground zones in addition to school zones, commenting, "I feel personally that my kids are more at risk in a playground zone than a school zone," she said. "In a school zone there is lots of adults around, always watching, with a lot of enforcement there, but the playground zones got only three hours in three months."

Holmes also felt that photo radar vehicles going forward should be clearly marked as such to increase awareness of the program.

Councillor Brennan Fitzgerald felt the amount of time spent in school zones was acceptable, but still had concerns over the amount of time spent on Cardiff Road and

at the pumphouse. "When we are at 36 per cent of the time [there], that is concerning," he said.

Although Council accepted the quarterly report for information, Councillor Dafoe subsequently raised an information request motion to have Administration come back to Council with the costs of ending the photo enforcement contract ahead of its natural conclusion.

Dafoe's motion, which he requested be a recorded vote, passed 7-0. Council is currently reviewing the Town's Photo Enforcement Policy.

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# Midstream Support Society decision delayed until Council meets with group

In a 6-1 vote, Council has passed a motion to hold a second meeting with the Midstream Society to discuss their needs for a new structure and potential partnerships that could be built with other community groups in the project to replace their ageing facility.

On Mar. 23, Council unanimously approved setting up a meeting between Administration, the Midstream Society, the Morinville Food Bank Society and Councillors Stephen Dafoe and Barry Turner to discuss the two organizations further needs.

As a result of that meeting, Council received a letter informing them that the Midstream Support Society and the Morinville Lions Club would be cooperating in a bid to construct a new building for both organizations use.

In the letter penned by Midstream Support Society President Linda Krauskopf and Lions Club President Francis Fryters, the groups indicated Midstream was looking for a 35-year lease on the existing property with the intent of finding funding for a new building. According to Town Administration, the building is no longer suitable for continued use.

The new centre would replace the currently ageing property that the Town lends to the society free of charge along 101 Street, and would also provide a new place for Lions Club events and meetings.

Town CAO Andrew Isbister presented Council with four options to consider:

1. Do nothing and continue with month-to-month lease until the building must be demolished.
2. Request Midstream vacate and demolish the building immediately.
3. Enter a 35-year lease agreement with Midstream where they will pay for the building of the new centre and pay a \$10 annual lease for the land.
4. Enter a 35-year lease with Midstream by building a new structure on the Town's dime, and have Midstream pay rent at a fair market value.

Councillor Barry Turner was the most vocal on the issue, saying he didn't think any of the options presented by Administration were the best options. Instead, Turner felt it would be better to consider another option that allows for more space for other community / social services support groups. He agreed that the Midstream society needed a new building, but felt that there was an opportunity for more community groups to get

involved in what could be a bigger building offering more services than just those offered by Midstream.

Turner felt that Option 3 would work the best, and wants a new structure built for the society, but also wanted to make sure that there be consideration to providing more space to other community organizations as well before the project goes forward.

After much debate and discussion, Councillor Boutestein moved her motion because she felt Council should ensure it is picking the option the society wants, and to discuss Turner's thoughts about a larger centre offering more space to other tenants as well.

Boutestein's motion to meet with the society within the next two weeks passed 6-1, with Councillor Stephen Dafoe opposed. While Dafoe did vote against the motion, he made clear in discussions after the meeting that he did support the Midstream's needs and request; he just felt that action on the request should have been passed that night.

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# Daycare running out of time and options

Increasing enrolment at Morinville Public School is forcing the closure of the daycare program located at the school, leaving many families without many options for their children's care.

School Principal Wayne Rufiange met with representatives of McCauley Out of School Care on Apr. 29 to inform them that space in the school would no longer be available.

Rufiange said the program's lease expires at the end of June but efforts are being made to extending its occupancy until the end of July.

The non-profit program currently accommodates 37 children aged from 4½ years to 12.

"The decision not to renew the lease for McCauley Out of School Care was not an easy one to make," said Rufiange. "Morinville Public School has had a very good working relationship with McCauley and having them rent space in our building was an asset."

The principal said the decision was made after a series of building operations and program planning meetings began in the fall of 2015, when capital planning documents, including requests for modular classrooms, needed to be submitted to Alberta Education.

In January, when Rufiange forwarded 2016-2017 student enrolment projections to the division office, he believed there would be enough classrooms to meet the requirements of the students.

He became increasingly concerned about that in the course of monitoring registrations in February, March and April and discussing class sizes and student program needs with his administration needs. Rufiange also discussed the issue with the Superintendent and Associate Superintendent of Sturgeon School Division. He is expecting 130-150 more students.

Ultimately he said that space is needed to accommodate student population growth and let McCauley Out of School Care know that the lease would not be renewed.

Loss of the space will probably mean the end of this McCauley Out of School Care program and unmet childcare needs for many of the 28 families now using it, according to Supervisor Meghan Nesbit.

She added that doesn't include another 20 families that are on the waiting list for September.

"There's just nowhere else," said Nesbit, who explained that program costs were subsidized for parents. McCauley has another program at Notre Dame School, but that is full.

"There are a few families where people might have to quit their jobs because of having no childcare."

The search for an alternative to the school space the program has been renting for about the past six years has been unsuccessful, she said. They have looked at possibilities including churches and vacant commercial premises.

Nesbit said the program needs space to accommodate 32 children at a time and have an outdoor area for them to play in.

"There's only so much we can afford," she said. "The absolute maximum is \$1,200 a month. One building owner wanted \$25 per square foot, which is not in any way possible."

Some of the building owners were not interested in renting because children are involved.

One possible option for staying at Morinville Public School also seems impractical, Nesbit said.

"The principal of the school offered to work with us on a location if we purchased an ATCO trailer. But if we purchased it we'd still have the costs of hooking up electricity and plumbing."

The province's Family and Community Social Services agency has been approached about the child care problem, but with no satisfaction.

"One person was told that it was not their job and they were busy dealing with the Fort McMurray fire evacuation," Nesbit said. Town of Morinville officials have also been contacted

"I do have parents advocating and doing everything they can. We're doing everything we can possibly do."

Nesbit's own seven-year-old daughter who attends the daycare might be able to stay with her grandmother. But, she points out, "There are other families who don't have anything."

Virginia Valenzuela is one of those without any backup.

Valenzuela moved to Morinville from St. Paul two years ago to study Social Work at Norquest. A single mother, she's an immigrant from Mexico and her family are all there.

She upset that closure of the program at Morinville Public School will leave her and others without affordable childcare and that the problem isn't being taken seriously.

"I'm really frustrated because it seems like government doesn't care," Valenzuela said. "They just seem to think it's your problem. They need to listen to us."

She feels that the Town of Morinville has a responsibility to ensure that affordable childcare is available.

"The Town should invest in daycare," she said. "They have to provide something."

Valenzuela is concerned that her five-year-old daughter will be psychologically affected if she doesn't get a chance to mix with her peers.

She is also concerned about providing for her child. "I have to continue my education. Is it better for me to stop working and go on welfare?"

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# Community Garden starting third phase

The Morinville Centennial Community Gardens is entering the third phase of its Champlain Park garden, located across from the arena.

When completed, the new phase will include a cedar gazebo, a walking path around the gardens, and additional plots, including raised beds.

Community Gardens Vice President Paula Collins said the objective of the project is threefold: to create a public community space, add additional garden plots, and to make the entire Champlain Park accessible.

"I think the key to what we are trying to do with the project is we're going to make it accessible to everyone," Collins said. "Our walking path will be wheelchair/walker accessible, and the ramps up to the gazebo will be accessible. We're even planning on having garden boxes that are wheelchair [user] accessible so someone who has a problem bending over or are sitting in a wheelchair can garden."

Collins said the group was planning a native plant garden bed to show visitors the beauty of working with plants native to the region.

"That's my project, so I'm really passionate about it," she said. "It's to encourage native plants and to show people there are some really beautiful plants out there that you can use in your garden. They are really easy to grow and will encourage pollinators to the garden."

The work will start this summer with three new in-ground garden plots to add space for at least five more gardeners. The new area will have two 12 X 30 plots and one 12 X 15 added to the existing plots at the park.

Also to be done over the summer are the



connective paths, which will precede the building of the gazebo at the end of 2016 or beginning of 2017.

Funding for the additions has come from a series of fundraising initiatives the group has conducted since about 2012, Collins explained, adding the summer's work will take plenty of volunteer hours and the generosity of a

landscaper who is assisting.

The current and future work to make the community garden accessible has been the result of collaboration with the Alberta Committee of Citizens with Disabilities (ACCD).

"We consulted them to access our Champlain site so that we can guarantee that it is 100 per cent accessible," Collins said, adding it provides the basis for the work going forward. "If this site does become 100 per cent accessible with all we are going to do, the Rick Hanson would like to do a promotion on us to encourage other communities across the nation to do this. It's such a huge thing for Morinville."

The raised beds that will form part of the plan will be built and installed in 2017 and consist of approximately ten accessible garden plots.

Currently, there are 28 gardeners between the Champlain Pak and United Church locations. Collins said there were currently three spots available at Champlain and three plots at the United Church.

The three 12'x15' plots for rent at Champlain cost \$45 per season and the three 4 x 8 plots at the United Church location are \$20 per season.

"It's our final curtain call," Hutton told Morinville News while the production was still in rehearsals. "We want to put as much into it as we can while we still have the time."



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
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# Vollrath returns

Locally raised fiddling champion Calvin Vollrath returns to the Morinville Community Culture Centre for three performances May 27, 28, and 29. His fifth straight year playing the venue kicks off on the Friday with a dine and dance event. Saturday will see Vollrath's annual CD release concert takes place, and Sunday afternoon features the Fiddle Gala his fans have come to expect.

As has been the case whenever the Grand Master comes to town, a geographically diverse audience follows.

"People come for this. Every year we get people from the Yukon to Nova Scotia to Oregon to Idaho," Vollrath said, adding this year's Morinville run will include special guests Doug Leahy and the Next Generation Leahy, a talented and well-known fiddling family from Ontario.

Saturday night's CD Release Concert will include Vollrath playing a selection from his three new CDs: Fiddle Lickin' Good, A Fiddle of This, and a Fiddle of That, and TGIF (Thank God It's Fiddle).

"We were very busy last year. We played more shows and we travelled right from California from Cape Breton playing music," Vollrath said. "We played lots of festivals in Alberta and all across the country. When you get to hear all the different music, you get inspired."

There is more to Vollrath's inspirational flow than a big year of playing festivals. A long life of playing Fiddle music that began with his first band at age 15 when he lived on a farm along Cardiff Road has provided the Grand Master with a wealth of experiences to draw upon when writing a new tune for his beloved instrument.

"We played all over here. We played all the communities around here," Vollrath said of the early days. "It was live music. There were no DJs. We used to play in the parade. It was a

huge parade, and we'd play the dances after for the Frontier Days."

But wherever he played, the fiddle was in the band. For Vollrath, the fiddle has a universal appeal.

"People love the sound of a fiddle. They love the sound of a violin as well," he said. "The music I play is lively. It's happy. There're lots of emotions in it. Times have changed. Back in the old days, there were lots of house parties, and there were lots of local bands that had fiddle players. Now there are lots of DJs. It's not so out in the public anymore, this style of music. So whenever we go out and play, I think it takes the people back."

Though Vollrath's crowd is typically an older crowd, the performer said the younger audience members who come to the shows also have a great time.

Vollrath's music reached a diverse demographic in 2010 when he was contacted and contracted to compose music for the

opening ceremonies of the Olympics. That music was put together in the many forms fiddle music is played across the country.

"Canada is so vast. We've got the Cape Breton style. We've got the Don Messer style. We've got the Old Time style. We've got the Metis style, the Ukranian style, the Bluegrass style. It goes on and on. I was honoured and tickled when they asked me to compose music that represented Canada."

Locals will have the opportunity to see Vollrath and his guests May 27 to 29. Tickets for the Friday night Dine and Dance are \$45, \$40 for Saturday's CD release event, and \$30 for Sunday's fiddle gala. Vollrath will be back in Morinville this summer when the Canadian Grand Masters Fiddle Championship comes to town in August.


