

Ron's Collectibles promises a trip down memory lane

When people talk about "the good old days," I'm pretty sure they are referring to a time when TVs lived inside giant wooden boxes and, if you wanted to change the channel, well darn it, you had to actually get up off the couch and turn a dial. The soundtrack of "the good old days" is undoubtedly some warm, buttery music playing off a vinyl record, filling a room covered with wood paneling and orange shag carpet.

But then again, maybe not.

Maybe your version of "the good old days," is watching Back to the Future on Betamax, while you played with your hot wheels, donning your very best AC/DC t-shirt.

It's inside these memories, images burnt on your brain of a simpler time that each one of us finds the meaning of, "the good old days."

For about four decades, Morinville resident, Ron Cust, has been collecting and searching out pieces of days gone past, reminders of important times or people in his life. In fact, his impressive collection had grown so big; it came to a point where he needed to make some important decisions on what to do with it all.

After some soul searching and talking with his good friend, Paul Smith, what he came up with is now one of Morinville's newest stores—Ron's Collectibles.

"[The shop] is about music and culture, rock n' roll, and cars," explained Cust in an interview. His shop is in what will soon be called 'Smith's Plaza' (the building where Smith's Music is also housed and is undergoing renovations).

Cust can be found at the store most days but said he would also open up shop for those wanting to make an appointment as well. Ron's Collectibles boasts a vast collection of vinyl LPs and turntables, old and new. Also stocking its shelves are old wooden radios and gramophones, Betamax machines, and classic TVs. There are die cast toys (think Matchbox cars and Hot Wheels), some of which are still in their original, mint condition boxes. Anything that can be described as "iconic memorabilia" from the '50s, '60s, or '70s can potentially be found on Cust's shelves.

"The neat thing about Ron's Collectibles is that I have price points for every customer. A kid can come in with a loonie and leave with a new toy car, all the way up to prices a serious collector would expect."

Cust says items like vinyl records—he has about 650 of them currently available for sale—are being sold at 15 to 20 per cent under market value. "It's a lot of fun when people come in they hear that great vinyl sound in the background as they browse our collection. It's such an excellent, upbeat atmosphere."

"Notably, I have what I call the "Gerry Gaetz Collection," which are a significant amount of records in near mint condition. Some of these records are making their way onto people's wish lists; it's the vinyl people remember buying as teenagers."

Cust said those looking to buy records, of course, require another important piece of the puzzle—a turntable. "We have modern USB turntables that are wireless...and also old-school ones, like some old Sony and Akai ones that are being refurbished."

Cust said his turntables would cost you anywhere from \$100 to \$350.

Not to be forgotten is a large collection of vintage hot wheels (from the 1960s-1970s) and original Matchbox cars from the 1950s, some of which have never been opened before. "I've been connecting with vendors from Great Britain, Australia, and France to make sure I have the correct decals and boxes if I don't already have the original packaging."

Since he was formerly Morinville's Fire Chief, Cust also has quite a substantial collection of die-cast firefighter memorabilia and collectibles.

"Last year, I set up a display of vintage toys at Smith's Music during Christmas time, and it was a huge hit," he said. The success of that event, and his friendship with Smith, who is also the owner of Smith's Music, helped Cust realize the store would be a fun and personally rewarding venture.

Smith and Cust are also partners in the annual Cars and Guitars show in Town.

"Doing the shop like this, it means all this great stuff that reminds people of their childhood or reminds them of something important to them is out there—it's not just sitting in a basement or being sold off, piece-by-piece, on eBay."

Cust said some customers have come into his store looking for a unique gift for their dads or other family members, a record or die cast they haven't seen in years. "And really, if I don't already have it, I'll help them track it down," he remarked.

Noting there is a big resurgence in some of these old-school items, Cust talked about another store in Town that also specializes in antiques and collectibles, Mercantile.

"Susan [Swanson] and Dave [Mills] from Mercantile have been so great,

and we've been in touch since even before they opened their store. We are aiming to have complimentary businesses," explained Cust, who says items related to old music or iconic 50s memorabilia, for example, are being directed towards Ron's Collectibles, while antique furniture and household items, some toys and other unique pieces are directed to Mercantile.

"We're a great match. I hope people will come visit one shop and then the other because, together, we make up a really wonderful collection between the two of us in Town."

Cust will once again be erecting a special holiday display at the shop this December, one that focuses on vinyl records with a Christmas theme. "People can come in and listen to Burl Ives and Andy Williams on LP like they did in the good old days."

Renovations on Smith's Plaza are expected to be completed by early 2017. A third business, a massage and wellness studio will also be located in the building.

Letter: Town and County issue joint statement on servicing

submitted by Town of Morinville and Sturgeon County

Joint site planning and shared utility servicing for both the Morinville Regional Arena/Multi-Use Recreation Facility and future Sturgeon County Campus is underway.

The adjacent development sites are located east of the Town of Morinville along Highway 642.

The site work is limited to site grading and general servicing of the site.

The site work will prepare the Town of Morinville's 77-acre parcel for the proposed construction of the future Regional Arena/Multi-Use Recreation Facility along with Sturgeon County's adjacent 50-acre parcel for the proposed future County Campus. There are still many decisions to be made regarding specific design, timing and scope of construction.

Both the Town of Morinville and Sturgeon County Councils understand the opportunities for collaboration where it can help to achieve Council's goals and contribute to a shared vision; they have been working together since 2014.

Both municipalities have agreed to develop a Joint Business Case for the Regional Arena/Multi-Use Recreation Facility. The business case will include key areas of: project governance, financial requirements, project risks and mitigation measures. A joint sub-committee of the Intermunicipal Affairs Committee (IAC) has been developed and will see three Sturgeon County's Councillors, Patrick D. Tighe, Jerry Kaup and Susan Evans along with Town of Morinville Councillors Nicole Boutestein, Stephen Dafoe and Gord Putnam for the purpose of supporting work on the Arena/Morinville Multi-Use Recreation facility and the pending application for grant funding.

National: U.S. election threatens plans for Canada's infrastructure

The fallout from Donald Trump's election victory continues. One casualty could be Justin Trudeau's ambitious infrastructure plan.

Ironically, that's because Trump has his own infrastructure scheme. The U.S. president-elect has promised to put \$1 trillion over the next decade toward problems such as crumbling highways.

Like Trudeau, the billionaire developer hopes he can convince the private sector to put up most of the capital for these projects in return for unspecified revenue streams (read road tolls and user fees).

Like Canada's prime minister, Trump is not particularly spooked by the spectre of big budgetary deficits. On top of increasing spending, he also wants to reduce taxes.

True, his tax cuts would benefit the rich more than Trudeau's. But the



fiscal effects of his double whammy on taxes and spending would be the same – bigger deficits and more government borrowing.

When there is more demand for money, the cost of that money – otherwise known as the interest rate or yield – tends to rise.

That's already started to happen. The yield on benchmark 10-year U.S. treasury notes has jumped by half a percentage point since Trump's election. The yield on equivalent Canadian government 10-year bonds has gone up by about one-quarter of a percentage point.

Citing, in part, the higher cost of financing, the Royal Bank raised its mortgage rates Tuesday.

Is all of this just a blip? Maybe. There is a lot of capital swishing around the world. That fact alone could depress interest rates again.

But the U.S. economy is still the biggest in the world. Canada's borrowing has no discernable effect on global interest rates. America's does.

All of this could spell trouble for Trudeau's economic agenda.

The prime minister came to power last year on a pledge to spend. His government, he said, wouldn't fret about balancing the budget each year. Instead, it would look at the ratio of federal government debt to the overall economy as measured by gross domestic product.

As long as this debt-to-GDP ratio was constant or falling, he said, the government would be satisfied.

In his economic update earlier this month, Finance Minister Bill Morneau made the bold admission that, under the Liberal plan, Canada's books will remain in the red for at least another five years.

At a time of low growth, this was probably the wisest path to follow. At a time of low interest rates, this was also an opportune moment for Ottawa to borrow money to spend on infrastructure.

The government plans to spend \$95 billion on such things as sewers and bridges over the next 12 years. On top of this, it wants to entice private investors to pony up an additional \$140 billion in return for unspecified goodies.

The debate to date has been about whether it makes sense for Ottawa

to rely on private-public partnerships that will ultimately cost more in the form of both profit and borrowing costs. David Macdonald, an economist with the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives, estimates this extra cost to the public at \$6.2 billion.

At a meeting with the Star editorial board last week, Morneau didn't dispute the fact that rebuilding Canadian infrastructure on the public dime would be cheaper in the long run. His real motive for involving private-sector entities, such as pension funds, appears to be political – a desire to show that the government can limit its borrowing.

Now, we have the Trump problem.

Sorting out the total economic effect of a Trump presidency is complicated. His wide-open spending plans, if permitted by Congress, could boost the Canadian economy. His protectionist trade policy could depress it.

His effect on interest rates remains a wild card. Rates are still well within the bounds predicted in Morneau's March budget. But the Finance department calculates that every one percentage point hike in interest rates boosts the deficit by \$1 billion in the first year alone.

If borrowing costs do begin to rise significantly, the Liberal government will find it hard to maintain its delightfully insouciant approach to deficits. If bond yields increase, the pension funds that Ottawa hopes to attract into infrastructure spending will have other places to invest their cash.

Much of Trudeau's economic strategy has been designed for a low interest-rate world. What happens if, thanks in part to Donald Trump, that world ends?



Public Safety Committee talks leaves future unclear

A long conversation from Council during their Committee of the Whole meeting Nov. 15 about the future of the Traffic Advisory Committee and a potential new general public safety committee leaves the future of both vague.

The discussion was brought to the committee by Councillor Stephen Dafoe, who first brought up the idea of a new public safety committee during the photo enforcement policy discussions. Dafoe's idea was to create a committee or board responsible for connecting Morinville's different community safety organizations on a semi-regular basis. Dafoe suggested Citizens on Patrol, Sturgeon Victim Services, The Jessica Martel Memorial Foundation, and Sturgeon Rural Crime Watches as some obvious groups to sit around the table.

Dafoe commented that right now these groups don't communicate about problems that they may have a lot of common ground on and that this important communication was a priority for him.

The idea was well received generally by the remaining members of Council, though there was a great deal of discussion about what form such an organization should take, as well as what the state of the current Traffic Advisory Committee should be, especially in the context of a new group.

Mayor Holmes felt that making a new official committee might put an additional strain on some of the likely members of the committee, such as local RCMP Detachment Staff Sergeant Riz Suleman.

This sentiment was acknowledged by the rest of council, with Dafoe agreeing that that may be possible and that another potential solution would be to simply liaise a meeting between the various public safety groups.

The key for Dafoe was that Council should focus on organizing a process that these groups would be supportive of and have buy-in. The next step in this process is direct consultation between councillors and these groups.

The Traffic Advisory Committee (TAC) was also a topic of discussion, with Council pondering potential changes to the committee, including a new change that would allow the committee to appoint their own members, rather than have them approved by Council. Councillor Nicole Boutestein

brought up a concern with this in that it would single out the application process for TAC, making it different than any other committee. Councillor Dafoe suggested instead that perhaps the committee should approve of its own members and simply have council ratify their choice, similarly to how members of the library board are chosen. This received approving nods from across Council.

No substantial decisions on either committee were made that night, as Council can not make decisions when meeting as Committee of the Whole, but the discussion sheds some light on the potential future for both the TAC and a potential new general public safety committee at future council meetings.

Strategic Plan changes coming following Council feedback

Council pondered a significant rework of their annual strategic plan document following a broad and nuanced discussion during their regular Committee of the Whole meeting Nov. 15. The document is produced by Administration each year with input from Council. It consists of pillars, areas the municipality wants to focus on, each with goals, sub-goals, and measurements/actions that the Town and Council should take to improve these areas of focus. It is the primary planning document from Council that lays out their focus for the coming year.

The discussion started off with Deputy Mayor Brennan FitzGerald questioning why the document needed to be as long as it was (this year's is 20 pages long) FitzGerald said that perhaps the document could be streamlined, looking at Council goals from a higher-level perspective. This was challenged by Councillor Rob Ladouceur, who initially said he felt the same way, but now thinks the detailed document is essential to offering some specific direction to Administration. Chief Administrative Officer Andrew Isbister offered his opinion that the length and level of detail are important for the creation of further, and more specific, planning documents for the Town. Isbister also noted that while this primary document is perhaps a bit of a slog to read, the Town also produces a brief four-page document for the public to view that gives them the gist of the important document.





Following this aside, Mayor Lisa Holmes got into the meat of many concerns she has with the state of the document as it exists now, with multiple members of Council joking that three years into their term, they still haven't been able to develop a strategic plan they are happy with. Previous years have also been subject to a lot of requests for revision from Council.

Holmes specifically was concerned about the state of measurements used to recognize Council and Town progress in certain pillars, particularly within the area of governance. For Holmes, the measurements felt unspecific and not useful.

Councillor Stephen Dafoe echoed the mayor's comments and discussed the lack of value in some of the specific measurements for successful public engagement: specifically public attendance at Council meetings or the number of people running for Council as measures of successful governance.

"Getting people angry about an issue isn't a good thing," Dafoe said, noting that people who are angry about a Council decision are more likely to show up to meetings or run for Council themselves, rather than agreeing with Council decisions, which provides no reason to attend meetings.

"Maybe bumping up our approval ratings should be a measurement," Dafoe quipped, referring to Council's low approval rating revealed by a recent Town survey.

Council concluded their discussion after talking about meeting with Administration for a day to work out issues with the document in a workshop.

Champion remains committed to Morinville, President says

Frank Burdzy, The President and CEO of Champion Petfoods, one of Morinville's largest employers, gave a detailed presentation to Council during their monthly Committee of the Whole meeting Nov. 16, sharing the recent successes and challenges his rapidly expanding pet food company has been facing.

Burdzy assured Council and residents that "Morinville will always be our home" and that they have no plans to leave Morinville, following recent rumors about the plant leaving. They have plans to invest in 30-plus new Morinville employees and are currently considering expanding by adding a new factory comparable to their Kentucky facility, potentially elsewhere in Northern Alberta. The Morinville kitchen operation could be repurposed for a different company line.

Mayor Lisa Holmes acknowledged that Morinville likely would not have been able to provide a factory site for Champion that would meet their high needs for utility access and space.

Paul Riopel gives impassioned speech encouraging Council to save Perras Place

One of Morinville's older residences slated for demolition has received a passionate plea from one of Morinville's most notable families requesting that Council preserves the structure as a historic site. Paul Riopel, representing the Perras family, made a presentation to Council at their regular Committee of the Whole meeting with hopes of saving the more than 100-year-old Perras Place. Most of Riopel's speech shared the history and impact of the Perras pioneering family, focusing on Joseph H. Perras and his daughter, the recently departed Raymonde Riopel (nee Parras).

The structure, built in 1903, is currently owned by the Town and currently houses the Morinville & District Chamber of Commerce and the Visitor Information Centre, though both are already being moved to the main floor of St. Germain Place (Town Hall).

Morinville's Chief Administrative Officer Andy Isbister confirmed that the site is slated for demolition potentially as early as next spring. The Town has not laid out a plan for what they will do with the land after demolition.

Riopel spoke clearly and with passion, appealing to Council to pay to preserve the building, located next to Town Hall along 100 Avenue. Riopel noted the importance of keeping this piece of history saying: "History is what provides an identity [to a community], giving a foundation from which to grow and prosper."

"The news that Perras Place was possibly being slated for demolition, rather than being preserved as a municipal landmark, came as a total shock to this family," Riopel said.

In recounting the life of Joseph H. Perras, Riopel went into detail about his "pioneering spirit" that Riopel felt defined his character, speaking to his many business ventures and

political activities as defining for generations what it means to be a "Morinville Man."

Paul Riopel also lauded Raymonde Riopel, affectionately known as "Rip" by many, who only recently passed away, as a "budding feminist" exuding a fiery and passionate spirit that he spoke to as an example for Morinvillians. Her role as a teacher for four-and-a-half decades, as well as her political activism and proud francophone roots, exemplified her character.

The legacy of these Morinville residents was good reason preserve this piece of history

for Riopel, and he reminded Council that a similar landmark — Juno House — was recently preserved in St. Albert by their council.

"There is no problem too great for honourable men and honourable women to find a solution," Riopel told Council.

Council did not have questions or comments for Riopel after his speech aside from a quick question from Councillor Stephen Dafoe on how many Riopel's were in attendance that evening. Council quickly moved on to the next item on their agenda.



Morinville Jets award Nick McRae Memorial Scholarship

The Morinville Jets held a special moment of remembrance before Saturday night's home game to honour the memory of teammate Nick McRae who was killed Sept. 3, 2012, in an ATV accident south of Edson.

McRae, remembered for his love of life and his ability to spread that love to those he came in contact with, had his Number 11 jersey retired the year of his death. Since that time the Jets have annually presented an award and a scholarship in his honour.

The former recognizes players with the qualities and attitude McRae possessed on and off the ice; the latter has been awarded to a Morinville Jet apprenticing in a trade as McRae did.

Saturday's pre-game ceremony was the fifth annual presentation of the scholarship. This year's recognition was presented to two Jets' players: Dylan Stang and Scott Woloshyn.
